

Term Honor Roll—3.5 GPA

Term High Honor Roll—3.75 GPA and at least one honors or AP class.

Honors at Graduation—Silver Cord—Cumulative GPA 3.5 through 3rd term of 12th grade.

High Honors at Graduation— Gold Cord—Cumulative GPA 3.75 through 3rd term of 12th grade and 4 honors or AP classes.

GPA Improvement—Increase GPA by .5 or more.

Academic Honor Cords— Based on cumulative GPA at end of 3rd term of 12th grade.

Honors - Silver Cord - 3.5 GPA

High Honors—Gold Cord—3.75 GPA and 4 or more honors or AP classes.

Departmental Honor Cords (Various Colors) Based on academic and citizenship requirements established by each department.

The Westerns Undergraduate Exchange (WUE) is a program where students in western states may enroll in many two-year and four-year college programs at a reduced tuition rate. The participating states include: Colorado, Hawaii, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oregon, South Dakota, Utah, Washington, and Wyoming. See www.wiche.edu/wue for more information. 



SCHOLARSHIPS FOR SOPHOMORES

American Legion Oratorical Contest for students grades 9-12. There are two parts of the contest. Each part has an assigned phase of the Constitution of the United States. State winners receive \$1,500. National winders receive \$14,000-\$18,000.

Ayn Rand Anthem Contest for 10th **grade:** This is an essay contest. Rules to enter are online at www.aynrand.org/contests. First prize is \$2,000; 5 second prizes of \$500 each; 10 third prizes of \$200 each; 45 finalists of \$50 each and 175 semifinalists of \$30 each.

Energy Solutions Foundation Scholarship for Sophomores: Students must plan on pursuing degrees in the fields of math, science, or engineering. In addition, applicants must plan to declare one of the following college majors: biochemistry, biology, chemistry, ecology, engineering, environmental science, geology, geophysics, mathematics, meteorology, or physics. Scholarship recipients receive \$2,000. In addition, the top 10% of recipients qualify to receive one of three Distinguished Awards in the amount of \$2,500, \$5,000, or \$25,000. Applications may be downloaded or submitted online at www.energysolutionsfoundation.org.

HOBY – Hugh O'Brian Leadership Conference: This is a leadership conference bringing high school sophomores across the state together. One sophomore is selected to represent Woods Cross.

Holocaust Remembrance Scholarship: Students in grades 9-12 write an essay on a specific topic concerning the Holocaust through www.holocaust.hklaw.com. Scholarships range from \$2,500 to \$10,000.

Jesse Brown Memorial Youth Scholarship: Students under age 21 who have volunteered at a VA hospital a minimum of 100 hours during the past calendar year. <u>www.dav.org/volunteers/Scholarship.aspx</u>.

Jiffy Lube "What Drives You"/"Teen Driver" Scholarship Program: For high school students. www.yourturn2apply.com. Scholarships range from \$1,000 to \$3,500.

John F. Kennedy Profiles in Courage Essay Contest: The John F. Kennedy Library Foundation invites U.S. high school students to write an original essay on the political courage of a U.S. elected official. For contest information, registration, and to submit your essay online, visit the Profiles in Courage Award Program at www.ifklibrary.org. Winner receive varying amounts.

Martin Luther King Jr. Youth Leadership Award: Students in grades 7-12 who are committed to and demonstrate social action, positive change and building bridges among cultures and communities.

National Peace Essay Contest: Write an essay on an assigned topic. One student is chosen to represent Woods Cross High School. www.usip.org. State winners received \$1,000 and national winners received \$2,500, \$5,000, or \$10,000.

New Century Scholarship: Students plan high school curriculum to obtain an associates' degree by the time they graduate from high school. The Utah State Legislature appropriates funds for continuing education to obtain a bachelors' degree at a Utah college or university. See your counselor for details.

Prudential Spirit of Community Awards: For high school students who excel at volunteer community service. One student is chosen from applicants to represent Woods Cross High School. State winners receive \$1,000 and National winners receive \$5,000.

Violet Richardson Award: For girls ages 14-17 who have demonstrated community volunteer efforts. Award varies according to available funds.

Voice of Democracy Audio Essay Contest: A national audio essay competition for students in grades 9-12 sponsored by Veteran of Foreign Wars. Essays are submitted to the local chapter before going to the state and national competitions. www.vfw.org. The national winner receives \$30,000.
